Assignments:

- 1. Create a poster on 8x11 paper advertising the book which depicts an important scene from the book. (Think of a movie poster.) Also include an important quote from the book. (These will probably be displayed in the hallways so make sure that they can be easily removed from your folder.)
- 2. Choose a character from the book and compare them to yourself. Are you alike or different? How so? Do you have the same beliefs, actions, or morals? Why or why not? (Must be at least 12 sentences.)
- 3. Write an epilogue to your book. Tell the story of what happens after the book finishes. (Must be at least one page, double spaced, and it must coincide with your book.)
- 4. Create a list of ten vocabulary words that you encounter in the chapter; look up the part of speech, the definition, and then use that word in your own sentence in a way the demonstrates your understanding of its meaning.
- 5. Copy down a TWO quotes from a character. Explain why you think they're important in the story. (Must be at least 12 sentences.)
- 6. Cast a character from your book. You need to explain in at least six sentences why this person would be a good fit for the character. You MUST mention the character's age, personality, and physicality. Print out a picture of your person to go with your analysis.
- 7. What is the main idea or theme of the story? Why do you think the author wrote it? (Must be at least 12 sentences.)
